The Committee holds the view that the supervisors and middle management should also have representation in the participating forums to enable them to fully involve themselves in the decision-making process. However, private sector employers' are opposed to this idea on the ground that it might create practical difficulties in the management of an undertaking.

The Committee is understood to have spelt out in its draft report the functions to be performed at the three-leaves. At the board level, the committee is reported to have suggested, *inter alia*, the following topics for discussion and decision: New technology, product mix and expansion schemes. It favours that the collective bargaining machinery should continue to be the forum for deciding the issues like wages, fringe benefits, bonus and housing.

The committee was set up in September last year under the chairmanship of Mr. Ravindra Varma, in pursuance of the recommendation of the tripartite labour conference held in May 1977. It is composed of representatives from employers and trade union organisations, public sector, state governments and some other professional institutions.

The Committee's recommendations on the subject is in conformity with the ruling party's commitment that it will "formulate a definite, clear and constructive scheme that would enable full, effective and meaningful participation of workers in the management of undertakings". Among other reasons adduced by the Committee for favouring workers' particulpation in management are: the system of consultative and joint decisionmaking in an undertaking ensures frictionless operation at the shop and plant levels; provides job satisfaction; releases the latent talents of workers; reduces their alienation; and improves operational efficiency which would ultimately benefit the community.

Kerala Unemployment Scheme


According to Mr. A. K. Anthony, Chief Minister of Kerala, the State Government is to formally launch in August next an unemployment allowance scheme, the largest ever social security programme in the State. This would benefit over 2.5 lakh unemployed youth of the Kerala State. All those irrespective of age or sex who have been on the live register of employment exchanges for a continuous period of five years would be eligible for assistance under the scheme. However, they should belong to families whose yearly incomes did not exceed Rs. 4,000. The beneficiaries would be asked to participate in some social service venture for two months in return for the assistance which would amount to Rs. 400 a year.




Impressive Rise in British Coal-Mine Productivity



THE NEED AND THE ANSWER

According to the 1971 census, over 80 per cent of India's population (still) lived in villages. Ordinarily, villagers tend to shift to towns and cities in search of employment, better living and greater security. But some post-independence steps in the form of Community Development Programme, agrarian reforms, developmental activities in rural and backward areas and provision of better means of communication and transport have combined to arrest this trend to some extent. This is evident from the fact that the percentage of rural population to total population dropped only moderately from 82.70 per cent in 1951 10 80.09 per cent in 1971.

On account of increasing stress on the accelerated all-round growth of the rural economy, the villagers now need no longer look to towns and cities for better living. Green Revolution of yesterday and the White Revolution of tomorrow have changed the hitherto gloomy out-look of a large chunk of the rural population. In some States, all villages have been connected with metalled roads and, in some others, electricity has been made available to all villages. Better medical facilities, improved educational arrangements and availability of ready finance through cooperatives and through the newly set-up Rural Banks have helped to create conditions which would eventually throw a greater burden on the police responsibilities in the area in the sphere of crime as well as law and order.

These developments are bound to exert a powerful influence on the psychology of the rural population to migrate to cities and towns. The 1981 census might witness a much reduced exodus to cities, provided the developmental efforts of the Government are quickly and competently matched by steps to ensure adequate security of life and property in rural areas. Such steps are all the more necessary when there are reasons to believe that vested interests are exerting influence to frustrate the efforts of the Government towards the upliftment of the poor. The need of the hour, therefore, is to give a serious thought to strengthen policing arrangements in rural areas and to take some concrete steps immediately.

In evolving the steps to enforce better policing two factors must be taken into account. Firstly, social tensions, affluence and decentralisation of power are likely to result in more crimes being reported from villages. The pattern of crime is also expected to undergo change. That it would be so is partly demonstrated from a study undertaken sometime back in Maharashtra, at the instance of the Bureau of Police Research and Development, on "Democratic Decentralisation and its Impact on Rural Crimes ".

The operation of factors like affluence and social tensions and a greater degree of awareness and politicalisation of masses in the rural areas would add to law and order problems to a marked degree. The police would have to be well prepared to deal with situations at a short notice and their success would depend on the assistance of the village functionary particularly in needing intelligence promptly at the developing or crucial stages. It is envisaged that these functionaries will be the eyes and ears of the police and alert and prompt in communicating information of interest to the Police.

Can the existing arrangements for policing of rural areas meet these new challenges? Is there any chance to successfully resuscitate decaying or nearly decayed traditional system of rural policing or is it time to bid good-bye to this institution and, instead, post constabulary to reside in villages to be responsible for the policing needs of rural areas? Are the existing police stations having jurisdiction over rural areas attuned to meet the new challenges and do they possess the necessary where withal to act competently? Lastly, can this work be left to voluntary bodies under the Panchayats in keeping with the trend towards Self-Government in villages? It is difficult to provide short answers to all these questions.

An ideal rural police institution should satisfy the tripple test or ECONOMY, EFFICIENCY and CONTINUTY. In order to improve the efficiency of policing rural areas, some suggest that a separate functionary on the same lines as the Village Level Worker should be created in each village to look after police work exclusively. Others suggest that the Panchayats should, by an order of the Government, be made responsible for making their own watch and ward arrangements in the villages. Both the suggestions are not practicable. The first suggestions will involve considerable extra expenditure. It will also add to the already numerous agencies of the Government working in rural areas and create avoidable confusion. The second suggestion may either amount to entrusting the work to voluntary bodies or the employment of one or more persons by the Panchayats to do the work. The former has already been examined in details and given up as inadvisable. The latter will in fact amount to diversion of the limited resources of Panchayats to non-developmental work and might as well fail to work. In any case, time is not yet ripe to hand over policing duties to the Panchayats.

The only alternative, therefore, seems to be to retain the traditional system of rural policing notwithstanding the fact that at present it is at once weak and inefficient. Here is an agency which bears the stamp of tradition and custom of the village and has come to stay despite a decision here and there to give it up. The advantage of local knowledge and constant touch with the local population is too significant to be ignored lightly. India can ill afford the huge expenditure which is likely to be incurred if policing duty in villages are to be entrusted to organised police on the same scale and pattern as in towns and cities. Even if resources were found to incur that much expenditure, it has been demonstrated how the villagers may not like the presence of a Constable in their mids and how the chances of his success in the performance of police duties, all by himself, are rather dim. It was on account of these very factors, namely, local knowledge, acceptability to the villagers, customs and tradition that the first


Police Commission of 1860 and the second Police Commission of 1902-03 recommended the retention of a system which had been described as discredited at that time, but, which, according to both the Commissions, could be streng-thened by suitable administrative and other steps. It will not be imprudent to ignore the recommendations of these high-powered bodies. No organisation charged with the responsibility of police functions in a village in India can function effectively unless it has its roots in the village and unless it enjoys the good-will and co-operation of the villagers.

#### **NEW LIFE**

What is really required is yet another effort to put new life into the traditional system of rural policing and make it efficient. It is difficult to support the view that the system has defied improvement. Take for example the case of Andhra Pradesh and Maharashtra. The traditional system of rural policing in both these States, especially in Andhra Pradesh, is working well. It appears that elsewhere, on account of vain hopes of finding a 'modern' substitute for the Chaukidar and on account of the vain wait for the Panchayats to grow and take over these responsibilities, the traditional system of rural policing did not receive attention despite recommendations by many expert bodies to do this or that to make it efficient. If it is realised that the village Headman and the Chaukidar constitute the only suitable agency to discharge functions of rural police, there is no reason why improvement cannot be brought about in its performance through suitable administrative and other measures.

But while retention and strengthening of the traditional rural police agency will provide some measure of police service to the villagers, it may not by itself be adequate to tackle the three new problems which are likely to confront the police, and about which a mention has already been made earlier. To recall briefly, on account of affluence, social tensions and party factions resulting from Panchayati Raj, the volume of crime in rural areas is likely to show an upward trend. The pattern of crime is also likely to undergo change, which has been demonstrated by a sample study in Maharashtra and which has been further demonstrated in the course of sample study of five rural police stations in five different States. Better means of communication and transport, better education and change of attitude are likely to result in a situation where the rural population would like the local police to respond to their needs without loss of time. The rural police agency, when revitalised and strengthened, will at best provide, so to say, the first-aid in police work which must be backed up by quick response from the local police. And lastly an increase in the frequency and magnitude of law and order problems will call for a greater dependence on the rural police agency in time to come.

The strength of an average rural police station in most of the States is too inadequate to be able to do so. Take the case of Bihar and Andhra Pradesh. There the strength of constabulary in the sample police station is 10 and 11, respectively. While the Gaundha Police Station (Bihar) covers an areas of 302 sq. kms. and caters to a population of 79,000 spread over 68 villages, the Oryale I. INDUSTRIES IN MAHARASHTRA

The Government of India carries out an Annual Survey of Industries (ASI) which covers the entire factory sector. All the factories employing more than 50 workers with power and more than 100 workers without power are covered by the survey i.e., on complete enumeration basis. The rest are covered on the sample basis. The Survey throws light upon the industrial activity (factory sector) in the State and in India. Based on the ASI data for 1975-76 Maharashtra stands first amongst all the States in India in the manufacturing activity. The share of this State is nearly a sixth in productive capital, a fifth in employment and a fourth in gross value of output and value added by manufacture by the organised industrial sector in the country. The per capita gross value of output and value added by this sector of Maharashtra was Rs. 1,301 and Rs. 285 compared with Rs. 500 and Rs. 107 respectively, for India.

The disaggregated data on manufacturing industries according to different areas of Maharashtra are available for 1975-76. They show that the developed districts of Greater Bombay, Thane, Pune (with a population of 23 per cent. of the State population) accounted for about 80 per cent. of gross value of output and nearly 83 per cent of the net value added by the organised industries in the State in that year. The per capita gross value of output by this sector was Rs. 4,456 for the three developed districts, Rs. 335 for the rest of the State and Rs. 1,299 for the State as a whole in that year. The per capita net value added was Rs. 1,010, Rs. 61 and Rs. 283, respectively for those areas.

The composition of industries in Maharashtra has undergone considerable change in the past 16 years. The industry group 'cotton textiles' which was particularly important in the early sixties was gradually losing its place while many other industries were fast coming up. Another industry group losing its importance was 'manufacture of food products'. The groups that were becoming more important were 'manufacture of chemicals and chemical products', 'basic metal and alloys industries', 'manufacture of machinery, machine tools and parts (except electrical machinery)', 'manufacture of electrical machinery, apparatus, appliances, supplies and parts', 'manufacture of transport equipment and parts'. Thus from a predominantly consumer oriented character in 1960, the pattern of industries in Maharashtra had shifted in favour of either capital goods or intermediate goods industries.

## Distribution by Employment Size

About 71 per cent. of the factories in 1975-76 employed less than 50 workers, 13 per cent. each between 50 to 99 workers and 100 to 499 workers and three per cent. 500 or more workers. The table below gives the data on important characteristics of the industries in the State by size group of employment. Factories with employment 100 and above, though just 16 per cent. of the factories in the State, accounted for nearly 87 per cent. of the productive capital, 76 per cent. of the employment, 80 per cent. of the value of output and 86 per cent. of the value added.

## Distribution by Capital Size

A classification of factories according to investment in plant and machinery (book value of capital) shows that small sized factories with their investment upto Rs. 10 lakhs were 86 per cent. of the factories in the State, medium sized factories with their investment between Rs. 10 lakhs to Rs. one crore were 10 per cent. and large sized factories with their investment of Rs. one crore or above were four per cent. The table below gives the data on important industrial characteristics by size class of capital. Employment per lakh Rs. of productive capital and gross value of output and value added per rupee of productive capital are the highest for small sized factories and the least for large sized factories.

Government attempts this through various corporations set-up by it for specific purposes. The promotional efforts for industrial development include development of certain industrial areas and provision of ancillary services in them. They also cover promotion of industries in selected areas through incentives to and capital participation in those industries. Various State agencies as well as centrally sponsored agencies take active part in these promotional efforts. The most important agency for the development of industrial areas is the Maharashtra Industrial Development Corporation (M.I.D.C.). The financial agencies that promote industrial growth in the State through capital participation are the State Industrial and Investment Corporation of Maharashtra Limited (SICOM), the Maharashtra State Financial Corporation (MSFC) and the Industrial Credit and Investment Corporation of India Limited (ICICI) a privately owned financial institution.

SICOM promotes industrial development of Maharashtra except the developed region of Bombay, Thane and Pune. It achieves this primarily by selecting certain industrial areas and by promoting them as growth centres. The areas largely developed as growth centres are Nashik, Roha, Nagpur, Aurangabad and Tarapur. In addition Kudal, Chiplun and Ahmadnagar are the centres fast coming up. SICOM operates special scheme of financial, assistance known as capital participation scheme for the medium and small units. It implements the scheme in collaboration with the 13 commercial banks and the Maharashtra State Financial Corporation. As a result of its activities and the assistance rendered by it upto the end of March 1977, 2,412 industrial units with project cost of Rs. 760 crores are committed to be set up in developing areas of Maharashtra. The number of units assisted increased to 2,582 by the end of January 1978 with a project cost of Rs. 850 crores. Out of these 1999 of the end of January 1978 with a project cost of Rs. 850 crores. these 1,929 units entailing an investment of Rs. 517 crores had either commenced production or were under construction by January 1978. The number of units in production on 31st January 1978, was 1,709 involving capital investment of Rs. 375 crores. As at the end of January 1978 the cumulative effective sanctions amounted to Rs. 95 crores and the disbursement to Rs. 72 crores SICOM also operates the Government's Package Scheme of Incentives as its agent. Under the scheme of incentive it has approved 1,687 industrial projects for assistance and sanctioned and disbursed Rs. 25 crores and Rs. 20 crores respectively upto 31st January 1978. It acts as one of the agencies for Central Subsidy Scheme of the Government of India under which the industrial units established after the notified dates in Aurangabad, Chandrapur and Ratnagiri are eligible for outright monetary grants of 15 per cent. of their fixed capital investment subject to certain norms and conditions. As at the end of January 1978 it issued to 161 units sanctions of Rs. six crores under the scheme and distributed an amount of Rs. four crores to 127 units. It also administers the Credit Guarantee Scheme for medium scale industries of the State Government. As on 31st January 1978 it had issued 173 guarantees for term loans aggregating to about Rs. 21 crores.

The Maharashtra State Financial Corporation (MSFC) which gives loans for creation of fixed assets to small and medium industrial units in Maharashtra,

sanctioned about Rs. 24 crores and disbursed Rs. 17 crores in 1976-77. In the year 1977-78 the sanctions and disbursements amounted to about Rs. 24.33 crores and about Rs. 16 crores respectively.

The Industrial Development Bank of India (IDBI) provides refinance to banks and State financial corporations for their loans granted to small units at special concessional rates. During the year ending June 1977, the refinance of industrial loans, sanctioned by the IDBI in Maharashtra amounted to nearly Rs. 37 crores. It also sanctioned and disbursed direct loans (other than for exports) of about Rs. 21 and Rs. 14 crores respectively in that year. The total refinance sanctioned by it upto September 1977 to industrial units in Maharashtia amounted to Rs. 105 crores.

The Industrial Finance Corporation of India, during the year ending 30th June 1977 sanctioned to industries in Maharashtra financial assistance (gross) of Rs. 13.41 crores (as against about Rs. four crores during the earlier year), which included loans of Rs. 13 crores and underwriting of Rs. 41 lakhs, and disbursed Rs. 11 crores. The net financial assistance sanctioned by the Corporation since its inception upto 30th June 1977 was about Rs. 128 crores or nearly 20 per cent. of the total sanctions in India. The number of projects to which this amount was sanctioned was 179. Of the assistance sanctioned Rs. 67 crores were for 62 industrial co-operatives.

Advances given by the commercial banks to various industries in the State and outstanding amounted to Rs. 1,970 crores as at the end of December, 1976, The small scale industrial units were sanctioned limits aggregating to Rs. 417 crores in 42,466 accounts, at the end of June 1977. Of these, Rs. 294 crores were outstanding. The commercial banks also generally provide financial assistance to industrial units set up in industrially backward districts at concessional rates of interest and on liberal terms. Thirteen districts (Aurangabad, Bhandara, Beed, Buldana, Chandrapur, Kulaba, Dhule, Jalgaon, Nanded, Osmanabad, Parbhani, Ratnagiri and Yavatmal) from Maharashtra benefit under this scheme.

The Industrial Credit and Investment Corporation of India gave net financial assistance of about Rs. 18 crores to the various companies in the State in 1977, as against Rs. 30 crores in 1976. Its total assistance upto the end of 1977 was Rs. 281 crores (32 per cent. of All India) and disbursements to Rs. 227 crores (35 per cent. of All India).

The Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) gave financial assistance in 1976-77 by way of underwriting, direct subscriptions to right issues of companies and loans of about Rs. 17 crores to the industrial units in the State. Of these, Rs. 4.40 crores were granted to the State Electricity Board and Rs. 4.32 crores to the financial institutions. Loans to co-operative industrial enterprises amount to Rs. 3.34 croies, and other investments including those in corporate bodies amount to Rs. 4.82 crores, The Life Insurance Corporation made additional investments of Rs. 20.32 crores between April 1977 and February 1978 in these sectors of which Rs. eight crore was in State Electricity Board, Rs. 4.43 crores in Financial Corporation and Rs. four crores in industrial co-operatives.

The Maharashtra Industrial Development Corporation (MIDC) provides the basic infrastructure for bringing about industrial development in the selected areas. By the end of 1977 the MIDC had undertaken development of 58 industrial areas spread-over all the districts in the State of which 46 industrial areas are in the under-developed regions. In the industrial areas the Corporation has taken to develop 19,000 hectares of land of which 15,003 hectares are already in its possession. The Corporation allotted 417 plots in various industrial areas in 1976-77 out of which 389 were in the developing and 128 in the developed regions of the State. Upto end of March 1977, the Corporation had allotted in all 5,410 plots. The number of units that went into production in 1976-77 was 388 thereby bringing the total of functioning industrial units to 2,599 by March 1977. Out of the 338 units that went into production in 1976-77, 178 were located in developed and 160 in developing region of the State. The fixed capital investment in the functioning industrial units in MIDC areas was about Rs. 612 crore. It is estimated that by the end of March 1978, 3,000 units with an investment of about Rs. 8,00 crore will be functioning. MIDC also operates various schemes to encourage young entrepreneurs. By the end of 1977, it has constructed 1,155 factory accommodations, 229 in flatted building and 926 on independent plots.

## Rural Industries Projects

The Rural Industries Project is a programme designed to create non-farm employment through the development of small scale industry, based essentially on local produce, raw materials and skills. The programme covers seven districts viz. Ratnagiri, Ahmadnagar, Osmanabad and Wardha (since 1962-63) and Dhule, Beed and Yavatmal (since 1974-75). The entire district excluding towns with population more than 25 thousands is covered under the programme. Nearly 1,200 prospective entrepreneurs were given technical guidance and 300 feasible schemes were offered under the programme in 1976-77 Rs. nine lakhs were disbursed under the programme to 452 loances in 1976-77, thereby creating an employment potential of 990.


### INDUSTRIAL ESTATES

One programme of assisting small scale industrial units is that of developing industrial estates, basically on co-operative basis. Sixty-nine such estates had been approved in the State, covering all districts, 62 of which were in the co-operative sector. As on 31st December 1977 Government gave matching share contribution of Rs. 1.68 crore to these estates and granted loan under Government guarantee to the tune of Rs. 3.63 crore. By that date 2,493 sheds were constructed in these estates and 1,920 units were functioning.

## SICK MILLS

The Government took over "sick mills" (Textile) in order to prevent unemployment due to the stoppage of such mills and set up Maharashtra State Corporation Limited to manage the same. The Corporation at present is managing six mills, as after nationalisation 21 textile mills managed by it earlier were transferred to the National Textile Corporation in April 1975. 1156 Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for June 1978 **BOMBAY\*** 325—A rise of 2 points

> In June, 1978, the Consumer Price Index Number of Working Class (New Series) for the Bombay Centre with base: January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 325 being 2 points higher than that in the preceding month. Tihl index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 famye iving survey at the Bombay Centre.

> The index number for the food group increased by 3 points to 349 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, arhardal, moongdal, masurdal, uriddal, fish dry, eggs, cura, ghee, turmeric, chillies dry, onion, garlic, coconut, sugar and rise in the sub-group index of vegetables and fruits.

> The index number for the Pan, supari, tobacco etc. group increased by 2 points to 367 due to a rise in the average price of pan-leaf only.

> The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group increased by 1 point to 340 due to a rise in the average prices of dhoti (bleached), saree, shirting, mulmul, markin, full-pant and vest.

#### NAGPUR\*

#### 319-A rise of 6 points

In June 1978 the Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class (New Series) for the Nagpur Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 319 being 6 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the Standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Nagpur City.

The index number for the Food group increased by 6 points to 343 due to a rise in the average prices of arhardal, moongdal, gingelli oil, groundnut oil, linseed oil, goat-meat, ghee, turmeric, onions, corriander, ginger, zeera, sugar, gur and sub-group of vegetable and fruits.

The index number for the I-B Pan, supari, tobacco etc. group increased by 51 points to 343 due to a rise in the average prices of Pan leaf only.

The index number for the Fuel and light group increased by 1 point to 298 due to a rise in the average prices of Fire-wood and Coal.

The index number for the Housing, remained steady at 187 (being six monthly item).

The index number for the clothing, bedding and Footwear group decreased by 2 points to 394 due to a fall in the average prices of dhoti, saree and Long-cloth.

The index number for the Miscellaneous group increased by 4 points to 236 due to a rise in the average prices of hair-oil, toilet, soap and school fee.

#### 338—A rise of 2 points

In June 1978, the Consumer Price Index Number for working class for the Aurangabad Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 338 being 2 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Aurangabad centre.

The index number food group increased by 2 points to 367 due to a rise in the average prices of jowar, turmeric, chillies dry, tamarind, jeera, potatoes, brinjals, tomatoes, garlic and banana.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 4 points to 366 due to a rise in the prices of firewood and chips only.

The index number for housing remained steady at 219 being six monthly item.

The index number for clothing and footwear group remained steady at 341.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 3 points to 270 due to rise in the average price of washing soap, anacin, toilet soap (lifebuoy and Hamam) and blades (six morning).

In June, 1978 the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Nanded Centre with base January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 327 being 4 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index number for the food group has increased by 3 points to 341 due to a rise in the average prices of turdal, moongdal, ghee, turmeric, potatoes, onions, brinjals, tomatoes, other vegetables, banana and sugar.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 1 point to 356 due to a rise in the average price of charcoal (patti) only.

The index number for housing remained steady at 130 being six monthly item.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 1 point to 346 due to a rise in the prices of dhoti, long cloth, shoes Bata co. and chapplis Bata co.

The index number for the miscellaneous group decreased by 1 point to 244 due to a fall in the average price of pan-finished (Poona Masala) only.
