Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class

The Bombay, Sholapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of October 1974 with the average prices for the year ended December 1960 equal to 100 were 297, 338 and 314 respectively. The Jalgaon, Nanded, Poona and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of Oct, 1974 with the average prices for the year ended December 1961 equal to 100 were 344, 349, 288 and 315 respectively.

Industrial Disputes

During August 1974, there were 74 strikes involving 32,737 workmen and a time loss of 1,19,053 working days, as compared to 60 disputes in July 1974, involving 17,417 working and time loss of 82,894 man-days. Further particulars of industrial disputes are given at pages to a 384 and 385 of this issue.

New Wage Policy to Benefit Labour

The Union Deputy Labour Minister said that the national wage policy which was under formulation was bound to bring out an improvement in the earnings of workers who were covered under the Minimum Wage Act of 1948. Presiding over the ninth meeting of the Central Advisory Board for Minimum Wages which met on September 23, 1974, after a lapse of six years, the Minister said that considering the developments of far-reaching importance both in the field of economy and matters relating to labour during the past six years there was need for a national wage policy which had never been so manifest as it was today. He added : "I am not in a position to spell out what shape the wage policy will ultimately take ; it has still to be worked out. I have, however, no doubt that the improvement in the earnings of the low paid workers who are generally covered by the Minimum wages Act, 1948, would continue to be the accepted objective of governmental action."

Labour Minister on Wage Policy

Mr. K. V. Raghunatha Reddy, Union Labour Minister, said recently that the question of a national wage policy had to be viewed in the overall context of national economy. Mr. Reddy said the concept of socialism would alone usher in a real wage structure suited to the country. For during the last decade or more, the incidence of inflationary trend had been very little in socialist countries.

Labour Research in Fifth Plan

Nearly Rs. 1.20 crores will be spent on research and surveys on various aspects of labour problems by the Ministry of Labour during the Fifth Plan period. It will cover both new and continuing schemes. of this Rs. 40.20 lakhs has been earmarked for new schemes which will cover research projects regarding the socio-economic conditions of women workers in industry, collection of statistics on industrial disputes, improvement of the labour statistics ; trainingcum-liaison scheme, annual survey of industries and the central directory of industries.

Factorics Act Benefits for Contract Labour

The Union Cabinet approved on September 20, 1974, the proposal of the Union Ministry of Labour for a comprehensive amendment of the Factories Act with a view to regulating service conditions and conferring certain benefits on the contract labour. The Government will bring legislation to this effect in the winter session of Parliament.

Management-Labour in Public Sector to Meet

Representatives of the management and workers of the public sector undertakings will meet shortly under the auspices of the Union Labour Ministry for a mutual agreement for curbing widespread strikes, lock-outs and other forms of agitations. An announcement to this effect was made recently by the Union Minister for Labour, Mr. K. V. Raghunatha Reddy, at the meeting of the

Wage rates in all the industries have registered a rise over the years and in 1973 the general index rose to 202.7 against 150.3 in 1969 and 183.9 in 1973. This works out to almost two-fold rise since the base year (1963-65) and an increase of nearly 35 per cent over 1969 and of 10.2 per cent over 1972.

Among individual industries, the highest percentage rise has been in jute textile industry at 68:9 per cent. According to the Labour Bureau of the Union Government; consumer prices, no doubt; have also gone up, but the rise in prices has been less pronounced than the rise in wages. Thus, there has been a perceptible improvement in real wage rates.

The 12 industries covered for the purpose are cotton textiles; jute textiles; smelting and refining of metal (including manufacture of iron and steel); manufacture of electrical machinery and appliances; railway workshops; soap factories; match factories; cigarette factories; hydrogenated oil; cement; sugar and paper and paper products. These industries taken together account for nearly 56 per cent of total employment in the manufacturing sector.

Compilation of similar indices for seven industries in the mining and plantation sectors is also being taken up. These are coal, mica, manganese and iron ores in the mining sector and tea, coffee and rubber in the plantation sector.

Among individual industries, jute is followed by manufacture of electrical machinery and appliances $(50 \cdot 2 \text{ per cent})$ smelting and refining of metal (48.7 per cent), cigarette factores (46.4 per cent), soap factories (38.8 per cent), hydrogenated oil (37.4 per cent), paper and paper products (34.7 per cent), match factories (31.3 per cent). and sugar factores (31.0 per cent). The case of other industries, like railway workshops, cotton textiles and cement factories, the percentage rise varied from 19.4 to 24.9.

As compared to 1972 indices, the highest percentage rise was again to be seen in the case of jute textiles industry, being 27.9 per cent, followed by cigarette factories (27.0 per cent), soap factories (18.9 per cent) and cement (12.0 per cent). In the case of other industries, the rise was less than 10 per cent. In the case of other industries, the rise was less than 10 per cent, the lowest (2.0 per cent) being in hydrogenated oil industry. In railway workshops, where pay scales of workers would have been revised with effect from January 1, 1973, consequent on the acceptance of the recommendations of the Pay Commission by the Government, the revised rates have not been considered since complete data in this regard are not available. Therefore, the indices have been compiled on the basis of the former rates.

Changes Suggested in Minimum Wages Act

Labour Ministers of the States, who met in New Delhi in the last week of September 1974, under the Chairmanship of the Union Minister for Labour, recommended amendments to the Minimum Wages Act to suit the changing circumstances. The suggested amendments provide for compulsory linkage of dearness allowance with the cost of living index as well as obligatory fixation of uniform rates of wages for both men and women workers. Minimum rates of wage for scheduled employments should be revised more frequently, certainly once in three years, and that non-payment of minimum wages should be made a cognizable offence.

Employment of Contract Labour

According to the information furnished by the Government of India to the Central Advisory Contract Labour Board at its third meeting held on September 17, 1974, contract labourr covered by licensees is eight lakhs, while the number of principal employers who have taken out registration certificates is 3,589. The number of contractors who have taken out licences is 4,797 and the number of inspections made is 5,566. The number of irregularities detected in these cases is 22,116.

We need friends in the churches, in business, in trade, in public libraries and schools, in fact, in any place where matters relating to working people and their unions are regulated, influenced, or even discussed.

What is not so commonly understood is that we also need friends within the labour movement.

You've probably attended a union meeting where delegates to your city's central labour union (often called a city federation of labor, or a trades council) were elected.

Or perhaps you've wondered why your union pays money (per capita taxes) to such a council, or to some other labor council or federation.

One of the chief reasons your union affiliates with these and similar organizations is simply that it needs friends within the labor movement. It goes without saying that all unions ought to be friendly to all other unions. and this is generally so in principle and in practice.

But it must be remembered that practically all unions are busy and understaffed and there's usually much work to take care of the needs of the members of the union itself. so that there's little time to spend on the problems of other unions. unless specific occasions arise where co-operation between unions is advisable and necessary concerning a specific problem.

Then, too, unions set up joint councils, city councils, and state federations to extend and multiply the ties and contacts within the labour movement. These councils and federations do things for the unions that the unions need or want done, and which they can't do themselves.

PEIU joint councils are set up because, through them, the SEIU local unions keep in touch with the important developments in the area; and because the councils can be called upon to aid the local unions when and where help is needed.

The cost of a union's affiliation with these councils and federations is very small in terms of value received, and the time spent by local union delegates at council meetings and other activities is most worthwhile. But this is not the whole story. Affiliation by itself is not enough. Local unions must actively participate in these councils and federations.

The labor movement is bit, it is busy, and it is constantly racing against time to get its vital business accomplished. So, here within the labor movement, it is vitally necessary to make friends. For the labor movement is a movement of vitality, growth, and accomplishments for people, and friends inside and outside of the movement are needed.

Service Employee local unions and joint councils have done a remarkable job of winning friends within the labor movement. This has not come about without effort, an effort that must be continued in the future. We have re-cognized the importance of friends, have ourselves done much to help others, and will continue and value these many friendships we enjoy within and will continue to respect and value those many friendships we enjoy within the labor movement.

Labour Asks Action on No-Fault Plan

The AFL-CIO pressed Congress to complete action this year on a federal nofault auto insurance law to replace the present "inefficient, excessively costly and unduly cumbersome" manner of compensating accident victims.

Legislative Director Andrew J. Biemiller termed the bill the Senate passed on May 1 "a good start." He urged a House Commerce sub-committee to improve it with the best portions of other bills that have been introduced, including one by Sub-committee Chairman John E. Moss (D-Calif.).

⁽ The Moss bill would establish a fully federal programe while the Senate bill would set minimum standards that states would be required to meet. 5

All of the bills, including versions by Rep. Bob Eckhardt (D-Tex.) and Rep. W. S. Stuckey (D-Ga.), "contain the basic principles oriential to an effective no-fault system," Biemiller said. His statement was presented to the subcommittee by AFL-CIO Legislative Rep. Kenneth Meiklejohn.

The AFL-CIO statement listed these "essential" elements of a good no-fault bill.

*M indutory insurance that guarantees full pryment of all medical and rehabilitation costs to all accident victims, regardless of fault.

*Immediate payment of benefits. *Restriction of court suits to carefully defined circumstances and a require-

ment that insurers pay attorney fees for policy-holders who must go to court to obtain payment of a justified claim.

*A strict timetable for implementation of the program.

Accident victims should be fully compensated for wage losses for the period they are unable to work, the AFL-CIO urged, with no ceiling on the length of time benefits are paid.

Persons with salaries above the level of compensation provided in the basicprogram should be able to obtain additional wage-loss insurance at extra cost, the AFL-CIO urged. Likewise a person with low earnings should be able to pay a reduc d rate for that coverage.

A major savings in auto insurance promiums would be achieved by considering the health insurance that a policy-holder might have as the primary insurer for payment of medical costs. The auto insurance would then be a supplement to health insurance benefits.

"When national health insurance is finally adopted, consumers will receive an added benefit through the reduction in auto insurance rates for medical coverage," Biemiller said.

He also urged the House panel to take another big step towards auto insurance reform by a probe of the manner in which insurance companie; set their rates.

He suggested that Congress direct the Secretary of Transportation "to conduct a broad-ranging study into the rate-making practices of auto insurance companies and to report his findings."

As important as the benefits of no-fault insurance. Biemiller said, is that the insurance be available "at the lowest possible cost."

Need for Promoting Industrial Safety Labour Minister's address at National Awards Presentation

The government, industry and trade unions should cooperate and coordinate their efforts to reverse the rising trends of accident in industry. The government, apart from enforcement of the statutory requirements concerning the safety, health and welfare of workers is also promoting educational, research and training activities under the aegis of the central and regional labour institutes. This was stated by Sari K. V. Raghunatha Reddy, Minister of Labour at the National Safety Awards function at New Delhi on 21st December 1974.

The Minister stated that the aim is to eliminate unsafe physical and mechanical conditions of work and simulaneously inclucate safe methods of work in employees. These are two vital limbs of any safety programme. To meet the Inillenge of various industrial processes, specialised cells in the Central Labour cestitute on industry-wise basis are proposed to be set up: These cells will have the necessary expertise to guide industry to make the plant, machinery and processes safe.

Aburt from the efforts made by the Government the Minister said, the trade union organisations and employers have a vital role in promoting safety in industry. The organisations should inculcate among the worker safety and productivity consciousness by providing human conditions of work. Suri Reddy said that safety officers should be appointed in all the industries employing more than 1000 workers or where manufacturing processes are specially hazardious.

Shi R:ddy said that in the year 1973 alone there was saving in foreign exchange to the tune of R: 45 lakhs recurring and in our own currency Rs. 130 lakes recurring and R: 75 lakhs non-recurring. These are only in respect of the suggestions which have been recognised at the national level and do not take into account results of miny more suggestions made by workers throughout the country. These savings in monetary terms are over and above the tremendous intangible gains in terms of improvement in products and processes and harmonious industrial relations. He also urged the managements to introduce such schemes in their organisations in the true spirit of workers' participation in minagement so that not only the workers but also the enterprise and the country as a whole gain by their efforts.

FAMILY PLANNING AND THE WORKER

TO help the women to lead a healthy, free and fuli life by accepting family planning as a way of life is the purpose of an experiment launched in a slum in Dadar, Bombay by Streehitakarini, a women's organisation. It is an educational-cum-Welfare experiment intended to liberate women from the belief that children are god-given, that life is pre-destined and nothing can be done about it. This naturally involves a redical charge in their outlook which is sought to be brought about by an integration of educational and welfare activity. The task is long and arduous but the actual experience of working in one of the industrial slums of Bombay has shown us that it is possible to carry even to our ignosant people through an imaginative approach of the knowledge of the process of human reproduction and the possiblilities of planning and regulating childbirth. As a result of an experiment carried on for five years, family planning was found to generate the much needed confidence in oneself and a basic change in outlook.

The slum is situated near Elphinston Road Railway Station in Western, Dadar, Bomb.y. We cover an approximate population of 50,000 residing in an area of 6,75,000 square yards. There are 167 chawls or permanent buildings with 6010 tenements and 5914 hutments forming three main hutment colonies. Physical facilities like W.Cs. washing places and water taps are very poor in the area, *chawls* being in a better position than hutments in the *chawls* on an average 27.04 people have to use one W. C. whereas in hutment colonies 258 people have to use one W. C. Similarly in most of the *chawls* ihe position of water supply is much better as only 14 people use one water tap but in. hutment colonies there is one tap for 266 people on an average. The result is the people have to fall back for these facilities on chawls. They use footpaths and whatever open spaces available as W. Cs. and use streets as washing places. No wonder the whole area is fi'thy.

This residential area is surrounded by a number of industrial establishments. Fourt big textile mills, two big printing presses, a pharmaceutical factory. twelve Industrial estates and innumerable small industries are situated in the area.

Educational facilities in the area are as poor as the area itself. There are four upper primary and one lower primary municipal schools, one night high school, one Hindi medium school upto seventh standard and twelve K. G. classes conducted by private agencies, six of which are conducted by Streehitkarini.

We have adopted a cafeteria outlook to contraceptives, giving the women a broad choice. She can choose condom or I. U.D. or pill for spacing. The first of course, depends upon the cooperation of the husband. We make arrange. ments for getting sterilization done at the Municipal General or Family Planning Hospitals, Similarly those women who want to get abortion done are also referred to these places.

But if a woman comes within 14 days of her missing the period, she is attended to at our clinic. We insist on putting her on some contraceptive immediately. after menstrual regulation is done.

This clinic gets plenty of work because of our other activities which bring us in contact with the community continuously. Out of 50 field workers who are carrying on different activities for us in the institution, 40 belong to the area. All of them have been trained by us in the institution as there was no place where we could train those workers for the type of work we wanted them to undertake. 32 of these are housewives who are doing the work as part-time workers. Involvement of the local community has helped us greatly in establishing contact and gain the confidence of the people which is perhaps very difficult in a locality like this.

A number of home visits are paid every day by our workers to do the motivation and follow-up work and also to organize educational classes for women. We carry on systematic general educational work by holding regular classes in mother craft, child welfare, hygiene, family planning, nutrition, citizenship and other subjects relevant to the everyday life of the community. For these activities we use chawls passage; or open spaces or hutments put at our disposal by the local vollunteers who are proud that the classes are held in their hut For this purpose, we have devised our own educational material like charts and models which could be understood even by the lilliterate people. Cooking demonstrations of cheap nutritious foods within their reach which these women can prepare are very popular even among men. We are succeeding though very gradually in getting rid of strong prejuddices about food partiularly to be given to young children.

Education films help a lot in this programme, but unfortunately there are practically no technical films in regional languages which we could use while teaching human reproduction and contraceptive methods. Perhaps the authrorities feel that films in regional laguages are not necessary. But once the woman or the man understands how reproduction takes place she or he can be easily convinced that it can be controlled ; and film is one of the best media to do this, Intelligent propaganda and dissemination of scientific and diss mination of scientific ideas is absolutely a must for family planning work at all levels of education.

Our nutrition and immunisation programme is helping children to become healtheir and thereby giving confidence to mothers that even poor people's children can be healthy if they are properly looked after. And this factor leads very satisfactorily to women accepting family planning quickly.

There are several so-called sports clubs conducted by young people for playing Indian games like *Kabaddi* and *Kho-Kho*. But most of the clubs are drinking and gambling dens; 4.9 percent of the rooms in *chawls* are used for ihis purpose. Illicit distillation is rampant both in *chawls* and hutments and goes on openly, parents sending children of 8 to 10 to buy their daily requirements are not an exception. Groupsfights leading some times to murders are not uncommon.

The challenge of the locality is thus great and we had to go about our work cautiously in the beginning. We were never troubled by any of the fights among different groups of illicit distributors nor did, any body object to our workers moving freely in the locality.

We conducted a Family and Fertility Survey of the locality with the help of Dr. Y. A. Sathe of the Statistics Department of the University of Bombay. Hindus form the majority in the area (11 percent); Nav Budhas (former scheduled castes) coming next—12 percent. Jains, Christians and Muslims form the rest of the population. 76 per cent speak Marathi, Telepgu being the next group 10 per cent; Gujarati and Hindi being 6 per cent each. Average monthly income of majority families is below Rs. 300 (US 30) per month—92 percent; 30 per cent getting Rs. 150 (US 19.50) or less per month. 32 percent men and 63 percent women are illiterate and 47 percent men and 23 percent women have gone uptothe primary level of education; a large majority of population above the age of 17 is thus practically illiterate as most of those who have left school at primary level have forgotten to read and write. 52 per cent families have five or more than five children.

We have taken men and women of 13 to 33 age-group as our target group for Family Planning Motivation. There are 8476 couples residing in the area out of which 75 percent or 6355 couples can be called eligible couples. Our activities can be described as integrated social welfare-*cum*-educational work with an objective of spreading family planning among the slum dwellers. The design given an idea of different activities we are carrying on ir this locality.

A general medical clinic for women and children (under 10 years of age) is found by us as perhaps the most useful single activity in spreading family planning in this clinic we have a full-time Medical Officer—a woman doctor who treats ordinary ailments in women and children just like in private general practices. All serious cases are referred to the nearby Municipal General Hospital. But besides this, this place forms a very good meeting place for family planning work. Having gained confidernce of the patients while treating ordinary ailments we are in a position to influence those women who are often found in a mood to listen to the advice. They also know that the clinic is a place where they can freely talk about their difficulties at home and will get good advice. The clinic is backed by a variety of other special welfare activities carried on by women, some of whom live in the same locality and share their social life. On an average we treat 1500 patients a month for ordinary ailments. The women can come to the clinic under any pretext thus avoiding a controversy with the elders in the family. Because of the experience we have gained we feel that a clinic of this type is a must if family planning is to take roots in a backward community.

Some of our activities are the needs of the community we serve but all of them are growing during the last five years and we fell that they are creating an atmosphere which is essential to the acceptance of family planning by a backward community.

After five years hard work we have 3,000 couples who have accepted different methods in family planning at one time or the other. 10 percent of these do not belong to the area but have come to us from outside having come to know about us. 20 percent couples have used more than one method; this means that 2,100 couples in the locality have used at one time or the other some method of family planning because of our work. We have thus covered 33 percent of the eligible couples in the locality, and out of these 493 have undergone sterlization. To many of us this means a very slow progress. But for those who have accepted family planning in this area it has meant not a casual motivation but a change in their outlook towards life. There can be no better guarantee we feel, of its spreading from generation to generation.

We have ample ovidence of this change though outwardly the locality as a whole has remained the same. A number of individual cases could be quoted where the living conditions of the families have changed completely because of a change in the attitude of the women in the family. INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS IN MAHARASHTRA STATE

REVIEW FOR THE YEAR 1973

Acts governing Industrial Relations :

In the State of Maharashtra industrial relations are governed by the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 and the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946.

Industrial Disputes Act, 1947:

The Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 applies to all industries in Maharashtra State as defined in Section 2 (a) (i) of the Actexcept those covered by the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946. It provides for the investigation and peaceful settlement of industrial disputes, through mutual negotiation, conciliation or adjudication. It also provides for the settlement of dispute by means of arbitration. Parties can also make a joint application for reference to a Conciliation Board, Court of Enquiry, Labour Court, Tribunal or National Tribunal. The Commissioner of Labour, Bombay, has been delegated the powers of Government under Section 5 of the said Act (1) to constitute a Board of conciliation, (2) under section 8 of the said Act to fill up the vacancy occuring in the office of the Chairman or any other member of the Board ; and (3) under sub-section (2) of section 10 of the said Act, to make reference of n Industrial Dispute to a Board when parties to such dispute apply in the prescribed manner whether jointly or seperately for such a reference.

The Deputy Commissioner of Labour, (Administration), Bombay, Deputy Commissioner of Labour, Poona/Nagpur have been delegated the powers of Government for reference of disputes to adjudication under section 10(?) and also under section 10(1) and 12(5), in relation to disputes regarding disnuissal, discharge, termination of service under section 2(A) and 2(K) of the Act. They have also been delegated the power of Government under section 15 and sub-Section (1) of Section 17 of the said Act, for publication of Awards of Industrial Tribunal and Labour Courts in relation to industrial disputes within the meaning of section 2-A of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 and in relation to industrial disputes relating to the matter specified in item 3 of II Schedule of the Industrial Disputes Act. All Deputy Commissioners of Labour and Assistant Commissioners of Labour in Maharashtra State have delegated the powers of Government under sub-section (1) and (4) of the Section 33 C of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947.

In addition to the work done by the conciliation officers, the Government Labour Officers also continued to be Conciliation Officers under Section 2A of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 for the year under review throughout the State of Maharashtra.

Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1947

The Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 was extended to the whole of the State of Maharashtra on 1st May, 1965. It now applies to specified industries viz. Cottor, Silk and Woollen Textiles, textile processing, hosiery, sugar, electricity-supply and transport, and banking industry in Western Maharashtra.

In Vidarbha since the Central Provinces and Berar Industrial Disputes Settlement Act, 1947 was replaced by the Bombay Industrial Relations Act 1946 from 1st May, 1965, it applied immediately to all the industries to which, the repealed Act applied, but subsequently it was in respect of some of the industries to which Industrial Disputes Act, 1947 was applied.

This Act therefore applied to all the industries in Vidarbha region, except certain specified industries.*

⇒(1) Industry engaged—in the generation or supply of electrical energy or both;

(2) in the conduct and Maintenance of public passengers transport services by omnibus ;

(3) in the manufactures of paper and straw boards ;

The Deputy Commissioner of Labour, Bombay (Conciliation) is the Chief Concilator for whole State and the Leputy Commissioner of Labour, Poonaand Nagpur are Additional Chief Conciliators for Poona Division and for Vidarbha and Marathwada Division, respectively. All Assistant Commissioners of Labour are conciliators.

rndustrial Arbitration and Adjudication :

The Court of Industrial Arbitration commently referred to as Industrial⁴ Court, Bombay, constituted under section 10 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946, has jurisdiction to decide the disputes arising in the Cotton, Silk, and Woollen, Textile Processing, Sugar and Electricity Industries, etc., in the State of Maharashtra.

The duties and powers of the Industrial Court are detailed in chapter XIII of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946. The Industrial Court acts as the Court of Arbitration in the disputes referred to it by the Government, the representative Unions, Employers and Employees. Under appellate Jurisdiction, it decides appeals preferred to it from the decisions of Labour Courts, Wage Boards, the Registrar, Bombay Industrial Relations Act, and the Commissioner of Labour. It also hears appeals in Criminal cases from the decision of the Labour Courts and appeals under section 6 of the Industrial Employment (Standing Orders) Act, 1947 against the order of the Certifying Officer. The Government may make a reference to it for declaration whether a proposed strike, lock-out, closure or stoppage would be illegal. Reference on the point of law can be made to it by the Commissioner of Labour, concilitiator, Labour Court, Wage Board as well as by the Government.

The Industrial Disputes arising in industries not covered by the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946 are referred to the Industrial Tribunals. The President and Members of the Industrial Court, Maharashtra, are also appointed as one man Industrial Tribunals under Section 7A of the Industrial Disputes Act, 1947.

There are Labour Courts at Bombay, Pune, Kolhapur, Sholapur, Nagpur and Akola, constituted under section 9 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946. The Presiding Officer of each of the said Labour Courts is also notified as Labour Court under Section 7 of the Industrial Disputes Act. At present there are in all thirteen Labour Courts out of which five are at Bombay, two at Pune, three at Nagpur, one each at Kolhapur and Sholapur and one is at Akola. In addition there are three more Labour Courts established at Bombay under I. D. Act, 1947 only.

The Labour Courts decide the disputes regarding order passed under the Standing Orders governing relations between employer and employees, changes made in any industrial matter specified in Schedule UI of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act and Schedule II of the Industrial Disputes Act. The Labour Courts have also power to decide the legality or otherwise of a strike, lock-out, closure, stoppage or change. Under the Industrial Disputes Act the Labour Courts have also to decide disputes about computation of benefits granted under Awards or Settlement.

The Office of the Commissioner for Workmen's Compensation and Authority Under the Payment of Wages Act is also under the administrative control of the Industrial Court with effect from November 1972.

There are Wage Boards for the Cotton Textile Industry, Silk Textile Industry and the Sugar Industry constituted under Section 86 of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act, 1946. The Wage Boards are competent to decide the disputes on the subject as detailed in items 1, 2, 4, 9 and 10 in Schedule II of the Bombay Industrial Relations Act.

The Industrial Court has to exercise superintendance over all Labour Courts and the Wage Boards in the State of Maharashtra.

The Industrial Relations cases filed during 1973 under both the Acts before the Industrial Tribunals, Industrial Courts, Labour Courts, conciliations and conciliation officers throughout the State of Maharashtra, as also before Wage Boards for Cotton and Silk textiles and Sugar industry were 37087 (including 21863 cases brought forward from previous year), out of which 17,087 cases were disposed of. The details of these cases are dealt with below :

Industrial Disputes Act, 1947.

(a) Industrial Tribunals—(i) Bombay.—In addition to seven hundred and twenty four adjudication references pending before the tribunals at the beginning of the year 1973. Five hundred and thirty four cases were referred to them during 251 continue to the section 33 during the year. At the beginning of the year, 251 applications under section 33 and 66 complaints under section 33A of the Act were pending before the tribunals. (c) Conciliation under Industrial Disputes Act, 1947.—The 6,775 cases (including 1,138 cases brought forward from the previous year) were taken up by the conciliation machinery during the year 1973. Conciliation efforts were successful in 1,403 cases. They failed in 2,246 cases. The cases not persued or withdrawn or closed were 1,834. The cases pending at the end of the year were 1292.

Disputes according to demands :---Out of the 5637 disputes received during the year, 1957 arose over questions of wages, allowances and bonus and the remaining 3680 cases pertained to leave, hours of work and miscel-s laneous causes.

And, whereas the said Committee has submitted its report to the Government of Maharashtra ;

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred by clause (a) of sub-section (1) of section 3, read with sub-section (2) of section 5 of the said Act and by clause (1) of sub-section (1) of section 4 thereof, the Government of Maharashtra after considering the advice of the said Committee hereby fixes with effect from the 1st day of December 1974 the minimum rates of wages consisting of-

(a) the basic rates of wages as set out in column 3 of the First Schedule hereto, in respect of each Zone specified in the same column for the classes of employees mentioned against them in column 3 thereof; and

(b) a special allowance, the rate of special allowance being adjusted as provided in dause 2.

2. The competent authority shall, on declaring the Consumer Price Index Number for working class (New Series) specified in column 3 of the Second Schedule hereto to be the cost of living index number applicable to the employees employed in the said scheduled employment in pursuance of clause (d) of sub-section (2) of the said Act, calculate the average of the cost of living index applicable to the employees in the areas specified in column 2 of the said Second Schedule for every three months in a year (the period of first three months commencing from 1st day of January), and ascertain the rise of such average in terms of points over the Index numbers mentioned against them in column 4 of that Schedule. For every such rise in the number of points specified in column 5 of the said Schedule, the special allowance (hereinafter referred to as "the cost of living allowance") payable to the employees for each of the three months immediately following the period in respect of which such average has been calculated as aforesaid shall be at the rates shown against them in column 6 of that Schedule.

3. The competent authority shall compute the cost of living allowance in accordance with the directions made in clause 2.

4. The cost of living allowance computed as aforesaid shall be declared by the competen Authority by a notification in the Official Gazette in the month of January; when such

(ii) Skilled.—A skilled employee is one who is capable of working independently and efficiently and turning out accurate work. He must be capable of reading and working on simple drawing, if necessary.

(iii) Semi-skilled.—A semi-skilled employee is one who has sufficient knowledge of that trade to be able to do repetetive work and simple job with the help of simple tools and/or machines.

(iv) Unskilled.—An unskilled employee is one who does work that involves the performance of the simple duties which require the exercise of little or no independent judgement or previous experience although a familarity with the occupational environments is necessary. His work may thus require in addition to physical exertion, familarity with a variety of articles or. goods. No workman shall be classified as unskilled if he is called upon to operate any machine. The Watchmen, Peons, Chowkidars, Sweepers, Scavengers and employees doing the work of similar nature shall be classified as unskilled.

(4) The minimum rates of wages in respect of an adolescent shall be 80 per cent of the wages fixed for the class of employees to which he belongs and in respect of a child 60 per cent of the wages fixed for the class of employees to which it belongs.

(5) The minimum rates of wages shall be inclusive of payment of remuneration in respect of the weekly day of rest.

297-A rise of 6 points

In October 1974, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Bombay Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 297 being 6 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at the Bombay Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 8 points to 336 due to a rise in the average prices of jowar, bajra, bread, arhardal, turmeric, dry chillies, green chillies, onions, garlic, jeera, lavang and a rise in the sub-group index of vegetables and fruits.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco, etc. group increased by l point to 263 due to a rise in the average prices of supari, cigarette and chowing tobacco.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 4 points to 351 due to a rise in the average prices of fire wood and kerosene oil.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 8 points to 226 due to a rise in the average prices of doctor's fee, medicines, railway fare, hair oil, tooth powder, blade, durrie, bucket, toilet soap and washing soap.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group and housing remained steady at 280 and 121 respectively.

338—A rise of 8 points

In October 1974, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Sholapur Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 338 being 8 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Sholapur City.

The index number for the food group increased by 9 points to 383 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, jowar, arhardal, masurdal, goatmeat, beef, fresh fish, dry fish, dry chillies, tamarind, gur and a rise in the sub-group index number of vegetables and fruits.

The index number for the pan, supari, tobacco etc. group decreased by 5 points to 234 due to a fall in the average price of pan leaf.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 18 points to 272 due to a rise in the average prices of firewood, coal and kerosene oil. The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 7 points to 237 due to a rise in the average prices of railway fare and washing soap.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group and housing remained steady at 350 and 157 respectively.





314-A fall of 12 points

In October 1974, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New Series) for the Nagpur Centre with base January to December 1960 equal to 100 was 314 being 12 points lower than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey in Nagpur City.

The index number for the food group decreased by 20 points to 359 due to a fall in the average prices of rice, wheat, jowar, arhardal, gramdal, moongdal, gingelli oil, groundnut oil, linseed oil and a fall in the sub-group index number of vegetables and fruits.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 5 points to 281 due to a rise in the average prices of firewood, coke, kerosene oil and coal.

The index number for the clothing, bedding and footwear group decreased by 8 points to 385 due to a fall in the average prices of dhoti, saree, trousers cloth, long cloth, markin and bed sheet.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 5 points to 208 due to a rise in the average prices of toilet soap, railway fare and washing soap.


The index number for the pan, supari and tobacco etc. group and housing remained steady at 221 and 149 respectively.

315. A fall of 30 points

In October 1974, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for the Aurangabad Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 315 being 30 points lower than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Aurangabad Centre.

The index number for the food group decreased by 51 points to 363 due to a fall in the average prices of wheat, jowar. grinding charges, gramdal, karad oil and prepared tea.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 3 points to 253 due to a rise in the average price of kerosene oil.

The index number for housing remained stationary at 201.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 5 points to 312 due to a rise in the prices of cloth for trousers, long cloth and coloured fabrics.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 5 points to 215 due to a rise in the average prices of pan leaf, toilet soap and railway fare.



In October 1974, the Consumer Price Index number for Working Class for Jalgaon Centre with base January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 344 being 7 points lower than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at the Jalgaon Centre.

The index number for the food group decreased by 15 points to 413 due to a fall in the average prices of wheat, groundnut oil, milk, ghee, other vegetables and sugar.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 2 points to 251 due to a rise in the average prices of kerosene oil and electricity charges.

The index number for housing has remained stationary at 139.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 3 points to 290 due to a rise in the price of long cloth.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 10 points to 234 due to a rise in the average prices of washing soap, toilet soap and railway fare.

In October, 1974, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for the Poona Centre with base January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 288 which remained unchanged as compared to that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Poona Centre.

The index number for the food group decreased by 2 points to 326 due to a fall in the average prices of rice, jowar, gramdal, groundnut-oil, fresh fish: ghee and sugar.

The index number for the fuel and light group increased by 5 points to 347 due to a rise in the average prices of fire-wood, kerosene and charcoal.

The index number for the housing remained stationary at 126 respectively. The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 5 points to 288 due to a rise in the prices of dhoti and saree.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 3 points to 218 due to a rise in the average prices of panleaf, utensils (brass), hair oil and railway fare.

Tweniy-seven of the disputes arose over questions of "pay allowances and bonus issues", Thirty-seven related to "Retrenchment and grievences about Personnel", Four on leave and hours of works and the remaining Six were due to other causes.

Out of the Forty-seven disputes that terminated during the course of the month Eight were settled either entirely or partially in favour, of the workers. Thirty-one in favour of the employers while the result of the remaining eight disputes were indefinite.


