## The Month in Brief

### Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class

The Bombay, Solapur and Nagpur Consumer Price Index Numbers for Working Class for the month of December 1980 with average prices for the year ended December 1960, equal to 100 were 408, 422 and 404 respectively. The Pune, Jalgaon, Nanded and Aurangabad Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for the month of December 1980 with the average prices for the year ended December 1961, equal to 100 were 384, 408, 457 and 440 respectively.

### All India average Consumer Price Index Number for Industrial Workers

All India Average Consumer Price Index Number for Industrial Workers (General) on Base 1960-100 for December 1980 was 408 as compared to 41 in November 1980. The Index Number for December 1980 on Base 1949—100 derived from 1960 based Index Worked out to 496 as against 500 November 1980.

### Industrial Disputes in Maharashtra State

During November 1980 there were 31 disputes involving 15904 Workmen and time loss of 42004 Working days as compared to 29 disputes in October 1980 involving 25108 Workmen time loss of 57293 Mandays. Further particulars of Industrial Disputes are given at pages 58 and 582 of this issue.

### Benefits under the Employees State Insurance Scheme

During the month of December 1980—20088 Insured persons received Rs. 37,43,889.77 cash benefits due to employment injuries. This includes 5,539 persons who were in receipt of pensions for permanent Disablement and 2,113 persons who were in receipts of Dependent Benefit as dependents of deceased Insured Persons. During the month 12,811 accidents were reported as against 10,748 during the preceding month.

## Current Notes

### Finance Minister Envisages 4 P.C. Industrial Growth

The country is poised for a rapid economic growth in the coming year (1981-82), Mr. R. Venkataraman, Union Finance Minister said in Bombay on December 27, 1980. Even for the current year he expected a four per cent industrial growth. He visualised the possibilities of 5 per cent growth in GNP next year and added that the growth in 1982-83 would be still bigger. In this context, he advised those who were agitating for higher wages to exercise restraint for one or two years, so that the country's economy could achieve a much faster growth. If the anticipated improvement was marred by go-slows, strikes, etc., he argued all investments that were taking place would be wasted. He argued that certain tendencies noticeable at present were against growth trends and they should be checked realising the difficulties through which the country had been passing.

### Steep Rise in Bank's Overtime Wages

According to Mr. R. Venkataraman, Union Minister of Finance, overtime payments made to the staff of the 28 public sector banks have gone up from Rs. 9.63 crores in 1977 to Rs. 19.99 crores in 1978 and Rs. 24.41 crores in 1979. For the six months ending June 1980, the overtime payments by the public sector banks have amounted to Rs. 14.58 crores. The big increase in overtime payments by the banks is said to be due to a situation in which such payments are resorted to on account of sudden and heavy rush of work such as half-yearly and annual closing of accounts and to clear the arrears accumulated due to shortage of staff or absenteeism on large-scale due to strike, agitation etc. The Minister said that the Government has been making efforts at the industry level to restrict the payment of overtime allowance to the minimum.

### More Job Avenues for Women in 6th Plan

The draft 6th Five Year Plan, now being finalised, will provide more avenues for employment to women, thus spoke Dr. M. S. Swaminathan, Member of the Planning Commission.

He told representatives of several women's organisations here on December 17 that it was imperative to ensure that women's needs received due attention in terms of resources, finances and infrastructural facilities in the coming plan.

He said that the District Employment Plan and the Rural Employment Plan would be recast so as to be relevant to women. Local Women Bodies, the Mahila Mandals, would be involved in the formulation and execution of these plans.

Dr. Swaminathan responded favourably to the vociferous demand that women be provided the facility of joint credit and joint title to land holdings and housing which would give them the much needed security denied hitherto.

The women organisations presented an intensive work done by various groups of five years. It urged the Planning Commission to form a 'women's group'. They asked for introduction of a new scheme with earmarked resources in all sectors and the States.

Dr. Swaminathan said that training programmes should be worked out which would include cadetship and managerial services.

### New Wage Policy in offing

Union Labour Minister Narayan Dutt Tiwari said that the Government was preparing a new wage policy in consultation with the representatives of employers and workers in a tripartite meeting.

The Minister, however, could not say when the meeting would be held as the calling of the meeting was still under discussion among the central trade unions on the question of membership verification of unions and Minister of State Ram Dutt Tiwari said.

The Labour Minister told a questioner that the Government would take a decision on the recognition issue only after a consensus. He wanted the trade unions to come to an agreement.

Shri Tiwari said that the Government was preparing wage boards for major industries.

According to the Minister, the Government was preparing a scheme for organised and unorganised workers, would include wages, mechanism for wage fixation and other matters among others.

He also informed that the Government would take into account all reports on this subject in its report on wages, incomes and prices.

Shri Tiwari further disclosed that the Government's wage board for non-coal mines was being set up.

Questioned whether the Government would take any steps to prevent the recurrence of strikes in the public sector, he said the matter was being handled at the State level.

Shri Tiwari claimed that the main objective of the Government for the next five years would be to maintain and promote the co-operation of the workers and the employers through discussion at tripartite meetings and through the enactment of laws which have ceased to benefit

The women organisations presented nine concrete recommendations based on intensive work done by various committees and expert groups over a period of five years. It urged the Planning Commission to make women as 'target group'. They asked for introduction of a 'special component' approach with earmarked resources in all sectoral plans and programme as in the Centre and the States.

Dr. Swaminathan said that training schemes related to the market will be worked out which would include cadre training of women for supervisory and managerial services.

#### **New Wage Policy in offing**

Union Labour Minister Narayan Dutt Tiwari announced here on January 13 that the Government was preparing a wage policy statement to be finalised in consultation with the representatives of workers and employers in the next tripartite meeting.

The Minister, however, could not indicate the date of the next tripartite meeting as the calling of the meeting depended upon evolving a consensus among the central trade unions on the criteria for selection. This and the question of membership verification criteria were being discussed with the trade unions and Minister of State Ram Dulari Sinha was trying to evolve a consensus, he said.

The Labour Minister told a questioner that the Government would take a decision on the recognition issue only if the trade unions failed to evolve a consensus. He wanted the trade unions to be free from political considerations to come to an agreement.

Shri Tiwari said that the Government was also considering setting up statutory wage boards for major industries.

According to the Minister, the wage policy statement relating to both organised and unorganised workers, would cover matters like the level of minimum wages, mechanism for wage fixation and linkage of wages to productivity, among others.

He also informed that the Government, while evolving a wage policy, would take into account all reports on this including the Bhoothalingam Study Group report on wages, incomes and prices.

Shri Tiwari further disclosed that details of setting up a statutory wage board for non-coal mines was being worked out by his Ministry.

Questioned whether the Government had any plans to stem the present spate of strikes in the public sector units in the South, the Minister said the matter was being handled at the State Labour Ministers level.

Shri Tiwari claimed that the main thrust of the labour policy in the coming years would be to maintain and preserve industrial harmony by securing the co-operation of the workers and the employers through consultation and discussion at tripartite meetings and making necessary changes in the existing laws which have creased to benefit the workers.

He appened to employers and workers to avoid confrontation, lock-outs and strikes and maintain industrial peace by solving their disputes through negotiations.

He added that an effort will be made to promote the welfare of workers in the unorganised sector which have not been brought under any welfare scheme so far.

Workers in agricultural sector would receive special attention regarding fixation and revise on of their minimum wages, he informed.

He further said that the labour administration machinery for enforcement of labour laws would also be streamilined to secure effective implementation.

The Minister announced that the Government was bringing forward in the ensuing session of Parliament seven different Bills to amend the present outmoded labour laws like the Industrial Disputes Act, the Industrial Employment and Standing Orders Act, the Trade Unions Act, the Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provision Act, the Payment of Wages Act and Plantation Labour Bill.

He said these amendments were broadly intended to incorporate the recommendations made by the State Labour Ministers at their meeting last year. These included the widening of the definition of the term "indus

### STRATEGY FOR INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT IN MAHARASHTRA

The number of large and medium industries in Maharashtra was 946 and of small units 4860 in 1961 which increased to 1675 and 54,544, in 1979. Here is an account of industrial progress which has put Maharashtra at the pioneering position on the industrial landscape of India.

Maharashtra has always maintained the pioneering position on the industrial landscape of the country. The first textile mill in Bombay and country's first railway line between Bombay and Thane over hundred years ago led Bombay city becoming an important centre of commercial and industrial activity in the country.

The industrial development of Maharashtra which took place prior to independence was of course on a very modest scale. The process of rapid industrialisation gathered momentum after the formation of Maharashtra State in 1960.

Maharashtra shares about 11.5 per cent of the industrial units, 18.5 per cent of employment, 16.1 per cent of fixed investment, 24.3 per cent of production and 24.4 per cent of value added by manufacture in the factory sector in the country. However, the most interesting feature of the State's economy is that the proportion of working force engaged in industries is more than in the country as a whole. The State tops in the list in respect of per capital value of industrial output with Rs. 1469 as against Rs. 559.5 in the country. Similarly, the average daily employment of factory workers per lakh of population in the State during 1976 was 2194 as compared to 1088 in the country.

#### Industrial Investment

The number of units and employment in the large and medium industries in the State in 1961 were, respectively, 946 and 6.79 lakhs as against 1675 and 11.63 lakhs in 1978. The estimated investment and value of output in this sector during this period increased from Rs. 432 crores to Rs. 3,000 crores and Rs. 916 crores to Rs. 4410 crores, respectively. There were hardly 4860 industrial units registered under small scale sector in 1961 as against 54,544 in 1979. The workers employed in the small units in 1961 were about 90,000 as against 7 lakhs in 1979. The estimated investment and output in this sector during the period increased from Rs. 45 crores to Rs. 328 crores and Rs. 213 crores to Rs. 1382 crores, respectively. This growth of industries has been the outcome of the inter action between the policies of the Central and State Government, advance of technology, the domestic and international market

forces and the entrepreneurship in the private sector. One prominent feature of industrialisation in Maharashtra is that the bulk of the investment has been through the private sector. This will be clear from the fact that Maharashtra's share in the total investment over Rs. 5,000 crores in the public sector undertakings of the Government of India is barely 3 per cent from latest annual survey of industries (1977-78) it is seen that in most of the major industries like food products, cotton textiles, wool, silk and synthetic fibre textiles, wearing apparel paper and paper products, rubber, plastic and chemical products, machinery, machine tools, electrical machinery and apparatus, Maharashtra occupies the first rank in terms of industrial output. As the industrial development in Maharashtra is primarily in the private sector, the State Government has been laying great emphasis on creating a climate which is congenial to investment in industry.

#### New Strategy

The State Government, has evolved a strategy for rapid and balanced industrial development as follows.—(a) dispersal of industries. (b) development of major agro-based industries preferably in the co-operative sector. (c) joint industrial venture in the under-developed areas and also in the field of sophisticated technology. (d) development of village and cottage industries. (e) self-employment for the educated unemployed.

The rapid development of Bombay and nearby areas was mainly on account of the existence of well developed infrastructure. The State has therefore been making special efforts to create infrastructure at a number of growth centres already identified. The MIDC has taken up development of 58 industrial areas covering all the 26 districts of the State. In all these areas 20,000 hectares of land is planned for development of which as much as 15,000 hectares is in possession of the Corporation. The MIDC has upto now developed as many as 7,200 plots, out of which 4,153 plots have been allotted and more than 3,500 units are in operation in this area. In the sixth Five Year Plan, it is proposed to invest an amount of Rs. 128 crores and MIDC would find Rs. 121 crores from its internal resources. The value of the goods produced at MIDC factories is Rs. 1,627 crores.

More industrial infrastructure is not enough to attract industries. It has to be necessarily coupled with social infrastructure. With this aim in view, the MIDC has undertaken water supply schemes involving an expenditure of over Rs. 33 crores for supply of water not only to industries in their areas but also to meet the needs of consumers residing in the nearby areas. For example, the Barvi water works of the MIDC providing water to consumers in New Bombay, Thane and Dombivali Towns, and several villages on route. Similarly, a provision has been made for residential zones for accommodating labour and management housing. As many as 1,170 sheds have also been constructed for technicians in various industrial areas.

The Maharashtra Small Scale Industries Development Corporation Ltd., (MSSIDC) has been working for all round development of small scale industries with emphasis on raw materials and marketing assistance including export marketing. The marketing activity of the corporation is primarily in the field

of contract and tender marketing with the Government of India, State Government and other autonomous bodies like, the Municipal Corporations, State Transport Corporation, State Electricity Board, etc. In this field, the Corporation has achieved an annual turnover of over Rs. 8 crores which is nearly 25 per cent of the total turnover of the Corporation. In the field of handicrafts, the MISSIDC has set up emporiums at New Delhi, Pune and Nagpur and Sales counters at Bombay Airport and at the World Trade Centre in Bombay. Special efforts have to be made to achieve industrialisation of the under-developed areas. For this purpose, the State Industrial and Investment Corporation of Maharashtra Ltd. (SICOM) has been established to extend assistance to industries coming up in the under-developed areas by way of (a) equity participation, (b) supplementary long term finance and (c) a package of graded incentives like interest free sales tax-loan, exemption in duty water royalty, sharing of the cost of project reports etc.

#### **Meltron to Meet Communication Needs**

After its inception, the Maharashtra Electronics Corporation decided that it would specialise in the broad spectrum of the communication needs. Consequently, it decided to develop broadcasting communication system, radio communication system and telecommunication system. While these media were developed and are being developed and would be developed by MELTRON by putting up its own manufacturing activities since areas were reserved under the industrial policy reservations for exploitation in the public sector. It has also sought to establish a dynamic inter-connective relationship between public sector organisations like MELTRON and the small scale units specially those started by the technocrats in the State. Consequently, MELTRON has taken up 22 Units as its associated for a period of 22 years and has given its name. In addition, MELTRON would also give attention to upgradation of quality of products by small scale units and for this purpose it is running a Development Centre in Pune.

#### **Balanced Growth**

The State Government attaches great importance to balanced regional development of the State and therefore set up four regional development corporations to undertake activities based on the industrial and human resources and demands in their respective regions so as to generate employment from the root level in the rural areas besides promoting and establishing industrial projects on their own in the joint sector.

#### **Incentives**

Another important fact of the strategy for industrial development is the incentive of incentives. The Central Government's capital investment scheme for backward districts is quite well known. In Maharashtra, three districts namely Ratnagiri, Aurangabad and Chandrapur have been declared as backward districts. As many as 876 new industrial units with an overall investment of Rs. 120 crores have been developed in these three districts by taking advantage of the scheme. A package scheme of incentives is applicable to the entire underdeveloped area of the State. The major incentive under this scheme

used to be interest-free sales tax loan to the extent of 8 per cent of the fixed assets of Rs. 50 lakhs whichever is lower during the entire period of eligibility and repayable after 12 years. As a result of operation of this scheme backward area has been classified into four groups according to the backwardness. The areas coming in the first group being well developed do not qualify for incentives while the areas falling under the remaining three groups qualify for incentives depending upon the extent on backwardness. While earlier the scheme was applicable to certain selected 42 industries, the scheme is now applicable to all industries.

The strategy of innovation of various schemes of assistance and incentives has been followed in the case of industrial estate was taken up at the beginning of the first five year plan. At that time, entrepreneurs were not coming forward in large numbers for setting up industrial units and as such the tempo of small industry development was on a modest scale. Therefore, at that time, a programme of constructing industrial estates at Government cost and giving the sheds on rental basis to entrepreneurs for setting their own industries was taken up.

Gradually, when the tempo of small industry development started picking up, the scheme of co-operative pattern of industrial estates was introduced in which the entrepreneurs are required to contribute only 20 per cent of the total cost of the estate, the State Government gives matching share capital of 20 per cent, and the remaining amount i.e. 60 per cent of the cost of the estate is given as a loan to be repaid after 15 years. By introducing this co-operative pattern, it has been possible to make use of the limited Government funds for setting up a large number of industrial estate covering almost all districts in the state. There are at present as many as 55 industrial estates where industrial units are already functioning. In addition to this the work is in progress in respect of 21 co-operative estate proposals. This strategy has yielded good results as it is clear from the fact that in the matter of industrial estates, Maharashtra occupies the first place among other States in the country. In view of the importance of textile mills from the point of view of employment, the State Government has taken over the management of as many as 26 sick textile mills and thereby avoided large scale enemployment problem of the textile workers.

#### Future Projects

The development of off-shore oil fields at Bombay High and the nearby Bassein North oil fields marks a cheerful event in the industrial development of the State. The ambitious plans of completing physical infrastructure to stop up the crude oil production, transportation and storage facilities for off-shore oil and gas is expected to boost the industrial activities of the State. Large amount running into several crores of rupees are expected to be invested in the refineries, petro-chemicals and fertilizers industries. This would naturally give boost to other industries like plastic processing, dyes and intermediates, pharmaceuticals, other organic chemicals which are based on the down-stream products of petro-chemical industries.

A new feature of pioneer unit has been introduced to give further boost to rapid industrialisation in the backward regions. Accordingly to accelerate

industrial development in Vidarbha, the Government had decided to set up in Bhandara district a Rs. 150 crore (Rs. 86 crores in 1st phase) medium duty commercial vehicles project of Ashok Leyland by 1983. Recently SICOM and Ashok Leyland Ltd., signed a memorandum of undertaking. The project will generate direct employment for 5,000 persons besides indirect employment for 25,000 persons on account of 100 ancillary industrial units. Region will also witness the setting up of two co-operative spinning units in each district which produce cotton, three cotton seed oil units and an orange processing factory. Besides, a 35 crores cellulose plant for making lint, by-product of cotton seed processing, with a potential of 25 ancillary industrial units will be set up. The State Government also decided to set up in three years two cement factories in Chandrapur district each having a capacity of 10 lakh metric tonnes.

With the innovative approach to the entire question of infrastructural development, incentives etc, it is expected that this opportunity will be made use of the maximum extent increasing the tempo of industrialisation of the State on scale much higher than what has been achieved so far.

In December 1980 the Consumer Price Index Number for working class (1960 series) for Nagpur Centre with base January to December 1960, equal to 100 was 404 being 1 point lower than that in the preceding month. 457—A rise of 9 points.

In December 1980, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class for Nanded Centre, with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 457 being 9 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 family living survey at Nanded Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 12 points to 496 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, wheat, jowar, masurdal, groundnut oil, fresh fish, dry chillies, mixed spices, onions, other vegetables and sugar.

The Index number for the fuel and light group remained steady at 621.

The index number for housing remained steady at 235 being a six monthly item.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 12 points to 401 due to a rise in the prices of dhoti, saree and long cloth.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 1 point to 351 due to a rise in the average price of supari only.

## 408—A rise of 2 points

In December 1980, the Consumer Price Index Number for Working Class (New series) for Jalgaon Centre with base year January to December 1961 equal to 100 was 408 being 2 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59 Family Living Survey at Jalgaon Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 1 point to 451 due to a rise in the average prices of jawar, turdal, groundnut oil, vanaspati, corriand and sugar.

The index number for the fuel and light group remained steady at 505.

The index number for housing remained steady at 172 being six monthly item.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 16 points to 370 due to a rise in the average prices of saree, cloth for trouser, local cloth and coloured poplin.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 4 points to 316 due to a rise in the average prices of pan leaf, supari and katha.

## PUNE

## 384 A rise of 4 points

In December, 1980 the Consumer Price Index Number for working class (New Series) for Pune centre with base year January to December, 1961 equal to 100 was 384 being 4 points higher than that in the preceding month. The index relates to the standard of life ascertained during the year 1958-59, family living survey at Pune Centre.

The index number for the food group increased by 4 points to 428 due to a rise in the average prices of rice, jowar, bajri, groundnut oil, fresh fish, dry chillies, vegetables and sugar.

The index number for the fuel and light group remained steady at 432.

The index number for the housing group remained steady at 134 being a six monthly item.

The index number for the clothing and footwear group increased by 11 points to 438 due to a rise in the average prices of sarree, cloth for trousers, longcloth, shoes and chappal.

The index number for the miscellaneous group increased by 7 points to 305 due to a rise in the average prices of supari and laundry charges.

PRESS NOTE SHOWING THE PROGRESS DURING THE  
MONTH OF DECEMBER, 1980

The Employees State Insurance Scheme applies to 34 Centres in the State of Maharashtra and provides protection to 16,42,884 workers in the event of employment injury, sickness and Maternity. This protection is made available in two ways namely by provision of medical care and cash benefits when needed. During the month of December 1980, 20,088 Insured Persons received Rs. 37,43,889.77 cash benefits due to employment injuries. This includes 5,539 persons who were in receipt of pensions for Permanent Disablement and 2,113 persons who were in receipt of Dependent Benefit as dependants of deceased Insured Persons. During the month 12,811 accidents were reported as against 10,748 during the preceding month.

Comparatively fewer persons need the employment injury benefits but a fairly large number need Cash Benefit in the event of sickness. During December 1980, 1,18,530 claims were received and an amount of Rs. 99,50,614.47 was paid out as sickness benefit. During the preceding month 1,04,811 claims were received and an amount of Rs. 88,70,945.65 was disbursed as sickness benefit.

Some insured Persons suffering from T. B., Mental, Malignant, other long term diseased etc. require more attention and they are being paid additional benefit called Extended Sickness Benefit. During the month an amount of Rs. 8,30,938.50 paid towards this benefit.

During the month 445 Insured Women claimed Rs. 5,84,899.60 by way of Maternity Benefit. The attendance at the dispensaries as per certificates received to as 3,17,090 during the month.

During the month Funeral Benefit in 180 cases amounting to Rs. 18,000 00 was paid.

During the month confinement charges in respect of wives of insured persons amounting to Rs. 96,900 00 paid.

During the month an amount of Rs. 16,661.00 was paid as enhanced sickness benefit to 102 insured persons who had undergone sterilisation operation for family planning.

For recovery of arrears of contribution under the Scheme, Legal Proceedings had to be initiated in 28 cases against defaulting employers.
